Introduction

In 2020, in the United States, the COVID-19 pandemic, resulting economic downturn, and demands for addressing systemic racism and its related disparities prompted many foundations to think differently about how they approach and conduct their work. In this study, we aim to understand whether foundations have been making changes to their practices in response to these events and whether they are incorporating these changes into the ways they will work going forward. This survey asks about types of grants provided, reporting requirements, support for organizations that serve the communities most affected, and planned changes to grantmaking budgets.

Foundation CEO Interview Protocol Spring 2021

Background

In 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic, resulting economic downturn, and demands for addressing systemic racism and its related disparities prompted many foundations to think differently about how they conduct their work, how they support their grantees, and their role in advancing equity for all. In this study, we aim to understand whether foundations have been making changes to their practices in response to these events and whether they are incorporating these changes into the ways they will work going forward.

CHANGES IN FOUNDATION PRACTICE

1. Thinking back to how the foundation approached its work prior to January 2020, and keeping in mind the events of 2020, what are the two or three most important changes you have made?

- 4. **Systems Change & Policy Influence**: In comparison to the foundation's pre-2020 practice, have there been changes in how and whether the foundation engages in systems change, policy influence, or advocacy efforts?
 - a. Going forward, to what extent will this be an area of focus for the foundation?

Supporting Communities Most Affected & Addressing Systemic Racism

In the United States, the communities most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, economic downturn, and/or systemic racism include communities of color – specifically Black, Latino, Native American, and Asian communities – older adults, people with disabilities, people from lower-income communities, and undocumented immigrants, among others. Since the beginning of the pandemic and following the murder of George Floyd by the Minneapolis police, there has been increased attention to long-standing issues of systemic anti-Black racism and growing calls for racial justice. In addition, there has been increased attention to anti-AAPI racism and violence.

- 5. **Supporting Communities Most Affected**: In comparison to the foundation's pre-2020 practice, what has changed in how the foundation is supporting the communities most affected?
 - a. More specifically, is the foundation funding organizations led by people from communities most affected by systemic inequities? Why or why not?
 - b. Going forward, how and to what extent will the foundation focus on supporting communities most affected by systemic inequities?
- 6. **Racial Equity & Systemic Racism:** How would you describe where your foundation is at regarding addressing issues of racism, systemic racism, and advancing racial equity?
 - a. Looking ahead, how and to what extent will you continue this work?
 - b. What are the main challenges and opportunities for your foundation both internally and externally – in advancing racial equity and addressing systemic racism?
- 7. In your opinion, beyond the work of your foundation, what is the role of philanthropy in addressing systemic racism?
 - a. What must happen for this to be possible?

Foundations Respond to Crises: A Follow-Up Study Nonprofit Leader Perspectives

Nonprofit Leader Interview Protocol Spring 2021

Background

Last year the Center for Effective Philanthropy (CEP) conducted a study exploring foundations' responses to the COVID-19 pandemic, resulting economic downturn, and demands for addressing systemic racism. In a <u>series of three research reports</u> released in late 2020, we published findings suggesting that most foundations were making changes to how they approach their work. These findings were based on survey responses from 236 foundation leaders and interviews with leaders from 41 foundations. These leaders represented foundations that varied in type, geographic location, assets, and giving.

We are currently conducting a follow-up study to better understand, a year later, how foundations are operating differently now than prior to the pandemic and what changes grantees have experienced in their work with foundation funders. In this interview, we will explore the following questions: What changes, if any, have nonprofits experienced in foundation and individual donor practice? What effects have these changes had on their organizations? What kinds of conversations, if any, have nonprofits had with their foundation funders and individual donors about their future grantmaking practices?

RELATIONSHIPS

Last year, foundation leaders emphasized the importance of strong funder–grantee relationships and spoke of the need to build trust, listen, understand, and work in deep partnership with grantees.

 - b) (If there have been changes) How have these changes impacted your organization?
- 5) Have you had any conversations with your foundation funders and individual donors about whether these changes will continue in the future? If so, what did they say?
- 6) In what other ways, if any, would you like your relationships with your foundation funders and individual donors to change?

FLEXIBILITY AND RESPONSIVENESS

Last year, foundation leaders told us they were changing their practices to be more flexible and responsive. They said they were providing more unrestricted funding and reducing what they ask of grantees.

- 7) Compared to pre-2020, is the funding you receive from **foundations** more flexible? If so, in what ways is the funding more flexible?
 - a) (If funding was more flexible) How did this flexibility impact your organization?
- 8) Compared to pre-2020, is the funding you receive from **individual donors** more flexible? If so, in what ways is the funding more flexible?
 - a) (If funding was more flexible) How did this flexibility impact your organization?

- 9) Compared to pre-2020, have **foundations** asked less of your organization? If so, in what ways have they asked less?
 - a) (If funders asked less) How have these changes impacted your organization?
- 10) Compared to pre-2020, have **individual donors** asked less of your organization? If so, in what ways have they asked less?
 - a) (If funders asked less) How have these changes impacted your organization?
- 11) Have you had any conversations with your foundation funders and individual donors about whether these changes will continue in the future? If so, what did they say?
- 12) What other changes, if any, would you like foundations and individual donors to make related to flexibility and responsiveness?

EQUITY

Last year, foundation leaders told us they were placing new, or more, focus on supporting communities most affected by the pandemic and paying greater attention to racial equity in their work.

- 13) Since early 2020, have you noticed any changes with regard to who or what **foundations** are interested in funding? If so, what changes have you noticed?
 - a) (If there have been changes) How have these changes impacted your organization?
- 14) Since early 2020, have you noticed any changes with regard to who or what **individual donors** are interested in funding? If so, what changes have you noticed?
 - a) (If there have been changes) How have these changes impacted your organization?
- 15) Have you had any conversations with your foundation funders and individual donors about whether these changes will continue in the future? If so, what did they say?
- 16) What other changes, if any, could foundations and individual donors make to how they are, or are not, addressing racial equity through their grantmaking?
- 17) What other changes, if any, could foundations and individual donors make to support your organization's efforts to promote racial equity?
